Rector's Corner

September

As a society we know that September is a month when we see so many readjustments and changes after the summer. I trust you did find time to enjoy rest, holidays, long summer evenings, time with family and friends and some sunshine. Take time to reflect on what the Lord was saying to you during the journey of the summer months for you personally and amidst many changes in our nation with the Labour Party now in government at Westminster, a

sporting summer with so many athletes from Northern Ireland doing so well at the Olympics and continuing unrest in many nations as well as in our nation. We do pray for peace in our streets and in our hearts as we love our neighbour as ourself.

I personally enjoyed worshipping in 2 churches when I was off in July, St Andrew's in Plymouth at their evening service with around 90 gathered and their curate, the Rev Phil Cairns who is from here speaking on 2 Corinthians chapter 11 and then in Dundrum Community Church as Colin Morris preached on Psalm 22. Do pray for Colin as he will be ordained Deacon on Sunday 1st September at 7.00 pm in Willowfield along with Kyle Flannigan who was with us 2 years ago on his placement. It was encouraging to see how churches function over the summer, welcome people, teach God's Word, practise hospitality, children's ministry on a Sunday and worship together in the evening. It was lovely to sit back and receive from the Lord in a church community where Jesus is proclaimed and people care for one another.

It was encouraging to have the Rev Mark Reid, Chaplain to the Mission to Seafarers speak at the 8.30 am and 10.30 am services on Sunday 4th August. He shared about the ministry, its outreach and his role as well as speaking on Jesus calming the storm. We passed on many gifts from parishioners of knitted hats and toiletries to Mark. Parishioners can still donate these gifts up to Sunday 1st September. The list of items is included in this magazine. I will be speaking to Mark about a parish visit to the port and mission and will look at a Saturday in September when the railway line is back up and working to York Street.

The new rhythm of this season is a time when our parish organisations resume and we thank again all who give so generously in terms of leadership, example and time for the benefit of others and the Gospel. We will have our 'Volunteer Appreciation Night' on Tuesday 3rd September at 7.30 pm in the hall and all who lead, help, volunteer should

take the time to be there and hear and support all that is being done in the name of Christ. I do encourage our church families to prioritise the activities of our parish in these coming weeks and give your full support to the groups and all who lead. The names of leaders and contact details are in this magazine, so contact them or the parish office for further details. Do invite others to worship and to our parish groups. Let's continue to build a community of faith, love and hope.

On Sunday 8th September, we are calling it 'Back to Church Sunday' as we will have our KLIC & JAM groups recommencing that Sunday and is an opportunity to be together as we share in worship and all that lies ahead over the autumn. I will be preaching on the person of Elijah on the first two Sundays in September as we resume our new 'season' in parish life and seek encouragement as disciples of Jesus. Our services in September are at 11.30 am in the morning with an early Holy Communion at 8.30 am on the first Sunday.

On Tuesday 10th September, we are having 12 Hours of Prayer in the Church from 9.00 am to 9.00 pm and people can sign up to cover an hour during the day. People can come at any time to pray for the parish as we resume our autumn activities, for our brothers and sisters in Uganda and Burundi, for our nation and the many issues in the world. It is a time for yourself as well to find peace and stillness in the presence of the Lord. Prayer is fundamental to seeing God at work in the parish and through us. Whether it is our own personal prayers, when we gather as a group, on a Sunday or at the Prayer Fellowship, let's resolve to keep prayer central for the Lord to be glorified in our witness and worship. In addition, we have opened the church on a Tuesday morning for private prayer from 10.00 am to 12 noon and this will continue during September. Do take time for prayer in the church and the fellowship in the hall. A regular feature of parish life is the Prayer Fellowship led by Wesley Dickinson on a Wednesday night at 7.30 pm in the choir room. A place to be as we seek the Lord and his will for our lives and the parish.

Connor Big Sing – Sunday 22nd September – Lisburn Cathedral

This Diocesan event will include workshops in the afternoon from 2.00pm for Choral and Instrumentalists. The Service is then at 7.00 pm and is open to all. People need to sign up for the afternoon workshops.

GFS Diocesan Service - Sunday 29th September

We are hosting this service this year at 3.00 pm in the church and our

speaker will be our Children's Development Officer, Victoria Jackson.

Healing Service - Sunday 29th September

We had a service on the 18th August with Bishop Darren McCartney, the rector of St Paul's Lisburn and I encourage you to come to this Healing Service at 6.30 pm at the end of September. You can come for yourself or someone else but you are coming to the Lord above all and He values all who seek Him. Prayer is central to this service in the privacy of a conversation and in sharing when hands are laid on a person in the name of Jesus.

Harvest Thanksgiving - Sunday 13th October

Our Harvest is a week later this year as we are hosting the European Methodist Conference in our halls the previous weekend. Do join in worship on the Sunday at 11.30 am and 6.30 pm. We hope to have a guest preacher at the 11.30 am service. The envelopes in this magazine are for Harvest and for the work of 'Missions' as we support the local Lisburn Foodbank [25%], the training of clergy in Luwero Diocese Uganda [25%], and for general mission and charity support.

CAP Money Course

This is a revolutionary money management course devised by Christians Against Poverty that teaches people budgeting skills and a simple, cash-based system that really works. This course will help anyone to get more in control of their finances, so they can save, give and prevent debt. We hope to run the 2 week course in October at 7.30 pm in the coffee bar. Gareth will be speaking on the theme of 'stewardship' on the 29th September and 6th October and we will begin the 2 week course after that. Speak to Gareth if you want any information and he will share about the course in early September.

Mental Health First Aid Course

We received funding from MindMatters which will allow us to have a 4 week course for any parishioner on a Tuesday night to build on the recent Sanctuary Course but which will be very different as it will be delivered by staff from Links Counselling based here in Lisburn. It will look at our resilience in the face of mental ill health in the context of faith for ourselves and all we work with or are friends to in parish life and the community. We hope to start in early November after the CAP course. More details to follow.

We also hope to run a 'Grief' course in early 2025. More details to follow.

The importance of 'GATHERING' is fundamental to our life as a church whether on a Sunday or during the week as disciples of Jesus. The image of the Church as the 'body' reminds me of how much we are connected through Christ to one another. I love the image of Jesus in John chapter 16 of the vine and branches and abiding in Jesus in order to grow, but all part of the one vine. We have faced many challenges because of Covid and life's rhythms. It has hindered some in being comfortable back in a building. I would encourage people to take the step back to worshipping together on a Sunday in September. I know many value the livestream of the Sunday service but if you are able to be present on a Sunday, come to encounter Jesus with others through the worship and fellowship. The live stream will continue as it is such a vital means of connections to those who are housebound, in nursing care, hospitals, who work Sunday morning or are on holiday. We face many pressures to conform to society but we are given the invitation each Sunday to shape our lives with Jesus at the centre.

As I write these notes, the Paris Olympics have just finished and as a sports lover, the opportunity to watch so many sports and athletes over a two week period was amazing. Some achieved their goals to just be at the Olympics and compete while others claimed the 'gold' medal in their event. There were disappointments and ecstasy in bucketfuls. Yes, there was the controversy about the 'Last Supper' depiction at the opening ceremony and an apology came thankfully. It did raise many conversations on what is deemed 'offensive' in our world today as well as looking at the theme of the painting depicting the Lord Jesus Christ breaking bread with his friends in preparation for his sacrifice and death for our salvation to enable people to be included in his family. It was wonderful to hear athletes speak of giving glory to God amidst achieving a medal. We will have used the Olympics theme as part of our Kids' Club and hope that as leaders work together, we will see our children and young people enjoying themselves but discovering anew the wonder of Jesus' love and the joy of following him. As a disciple of Jesus, it is about running the race of life for his Glory, being supported by friends and coaches, keeping fixed on the goal and that reward for all disciples in heaven. Olympics speak of 'legacy' and as I preached on Sunday 11th August on being 'Imitators of God' [Ephesians 5:1], there is the challenge and opportunity in shaping lives of all ages with the greatest news of all, the Lord Jesus Christ. May that be our prayer in this new season of parish life.


- For the work of Open Doors in supporting Christians where they are persecuted especially in Afghanistan, Myanmar and Nigeria at this time.

TIME

Let's talk about time.....are you one of those people who is constantly looking at your watch, being on time so that you can be at another place on time or rushing to the next appointment. In 2nd Peter 3 v 8, "But beloved, be not ignorant of this one thing, that one day with The Lord is as a thousand years, and a thousand years is as one day."

God does not look at time the same way that we do. If God looked at time the way we do, He would answer Prayer a lot more quickly. But, of course, there was space before time existed. It says in Genesis that we had the evening, then the morning, and that was the first day. It's as if God stepped out of The Eternal Heavens and stepped into our time. Of course, when Jesus walked this earth He lived under that 24 hour schedule, but Jesus does not look at time the way you and I do. When Jesus heard that Lazarus was sick, he stayed 2 more days in the place that they were and He said, "My friend Lazarus is asleep but I am going to wake him up."

When it came to Jairus' daughter, Jairus fell down at the feet of Jesus and begged.... "You need to come now, this very minute, my daughter is sick." But Jesus at this time was caught out with the woman who had an issue of blood so He had to spend time with her. Jesus eventually arrives at the house of Jairus and informs the family that the child is not dead but is sleeping. Jesus looks differently at time.... He is never early, and He is never late.

During the past 10 years I have been involved with The Church's Ministry of Healing in Belfast and in St Anne's Cathedral every Friday at The Healing Service. It is such an honour to play such a small role in that Ministry as we Pray with others at their point of need. The one thing that I have learnt from past experiences is that we must trust in God's timing..... He is never early, and He is never late. Trust me when I say that I have witnessed Christ's intervention on many occasions....He will turn up, His timing is perfection.

When talking about time, can I ask you a question, How much time do you personally give up to have intimacy with your personal Saviour Jesus? How much time do you give the time maker? He is never early, and He is never late.

As you read this article today I would encourage you to take the time on your hectic schedule to draw closer to Jesus and then you will truly know that His everlasting arms always surround you as you journey through your lives and time.



Summer Madness

At the beginning of this summer, a small group of young people from CCY (Christ Church Youth) set off with their tents to attend the annual Summer Madness festival in Portglenone, a gathering that brought together thousands of other young people from across the country. For many, this event is the highlight of the year in our calendar of events.



The festival offered a vibrant mix of worship sessions, workshops, and outdoor activities that engaged young people to ask questions about faith. We attended worship in the big top circus tent twice a day, we slept in tents in cold July nights and we even managed a wet speed boat trip on one of the afternoons.

Throughout the weekend, the group found themselves deeply impacted by

the experience. The worship and teaching fostered of sense connection and purpose and created a space for meaningful conversations on faith and life challenges. Many nights were spent



sitting on deck chairs with blankets and hot chocolate discussing school, faith and pressures until the small hours of the morning. It was a great encouragement to hear young people passionate about Jesus and wanting to know him more. Throughout the weekend over 200 young people became followers of Jesus for the first time, with hundreds more making commitments to rise up as future leaders in our churches and communities.



As the festival came to an end, the group left with renewed spirits and a deeper understanding of their beliefs. Summer Madness has given them more than iust memories; it had provided a space spiritual growth and discovery of what it means to be part of a supportive Christian community. and I hope continue to endeavour to make them feel a part of our church

As much as I am very vocally not a fan sleeping in a tent on an inflatable bed in the middle of a field that's occupied by sheep for 50 weeks a year, I can guarantee you I'll be back next year.

Knitting Pattern for Woollen Hats

You will need:

Double knit or 4 ply wool Size 8 (4mm) Needles 2 oz of wool

Cast on 120 stitches.

Rib (2 plain 2 purl) for 12 inches

Next Row: Knit 2 together to end of the row. Purl next row.

Repeat these two rows once more.

Knit 1 row. Purl 1 row.

Pull thread through all stitches and sew up seam.






