Harvest Thanksgiving

Our Harvest season of services and events was slightly longer this year but complemented what Gareth had been sharing on 'stewardship' over a number of weeks. Gareth organised a CAP money course over 2 Tuesdays which Alan Crawford facilitated and I am encouraged by the small group of people who took time to explore these issues but support the important matter of stewarding our 'money'. I hear so much about the challenges of the

'cost of living' and I would think we could repeat the course next year to help people in these matters.

Gareth did also mention about a small group of people to explore 'creation care' in our context. Please do speak to us on this matter. I do love the wonder of a church surrounded by trees and the blanket of leaves in autumn. Thank you to all who decorated our church so beautifully. I am also conscious of people's generosity to the Harvest Mission Appeal which is around £4,800.00 and that will make a huge difference locally and globally.

Mental Health First Aid Course

We have begun this 4 week course with Susan and Jackie from Links Counselling with 18 people attending. The funding from MindMatters allows us to address the crucial area of mental ill-health and create ways to support one another further in the life of the parish. More details of the sessions to follow next time.

Remembrance Sunday

I am grateful to all who helped facilitate the 2 services particularly the clergy, our organist Ross, choir, men's choir, welcome teams and all on AV. It was encouraging to live-stream both services. Above all, on such a day to speak words of hope, peace and reconciliation to all gathered including members of the Royal British Legion, civic leaders, cadets and parishioners. The sun even made an appearance to allow a drier parade.

Archbishop of Canterbury

Archbishop Justin Welby resigned from his role on Tuesday 12th November after the damning Makin report into the abuse by John Smyth and the church's silence about these abuses and the care for his victims. We pray for all who have been traumatised by abuse by clergy or lay people in the church.

Dementia Care

On Tuesday 5th November, we facilitated a period in our Tuesday Coffee Morning to hear the story of Allison Batchelor who is living with dementia. She shared her story, its challenges and joys. Our own Maureen Doran shared about Lisburn Community Dementia Care and its work, support and outreach when they meet once a month in our hall. We valued their inputs and sharing of stories and information. In particular hearing about **'The HERBERT PROTOCOL'**, which helps to trace missing people with dementia. The form can be downloaded from the PSNI website.

In the same week, the Acorn Club for our seniors welcomed Michael Cochrane to speak on his role in working for Prison Fellowship and this vital ministry in our prisons with a team of staff and volunteers across 3 prisons and as they work in the community. The Mothers' Union welcomed Val Thom who works for Church Army in the Zacchaeus Project in Armagh Diocese with a focus on outreach to bands and their community. She shared the story of their beginnings and outreach with the bands forum and at parades. We can pray for people like Michael and Val and their roles in reaching out with the love of Christ in two very different environments.

Advent

We live in a world where Christmas has been in our face from September and yet many have fatigue by the time of the 25th of December! The 12 days of Christmas only begin on Christmas Day. We do need to plan and budget well in these days but also take time to enjoy this season in its fulness. We are deeply challenged to focus on the love of God in the gift of Jesus as the babe of Bethlehem, the Saviour of the world. When we watch advertisements, we are encouraged to spend and indulge ourselves.

Advent is the beginning of the church's year and is a time of preparation for the 'coming of the Saviour' and his return. We will use the Advent Wreath to focus on Christ's coming at our services from the 1st December.

We have our monthly Messy Church in the hall at 4.00 pm and it always is an informal gathering for children, parents and grandparents with plenty of crafts, food and worship. Many children love an Advent calendar, but I wonder which do you choose? Have you walked into the Faith Mission bookshop to look at one which looks forward to Jesus' coming? Why not order 'God's Big Promises Advent Calendar' by Carl Laferton from the Good Book Company? It includes family devotions as well. Do use the daily readings to draw close to the story of Christ's coming but also preparing ourselves for his second coming as judge. Take time to find that quiet place to ponder the wonder of the plan of salvation for the world. There are a couple of books to recommend for the Advent season but you can sign up to devotionals through organisations such as Tear Fund by going to the website and clicking on the link for 'A Living Hope': *'The One True Story' or 'The One True Light', by Tim Chester [The Good Book Company]*

'Unexpected Jesus' by Anna Robbins and 'A Strange Christmas' by Krish Kandiah [Cover to Cover series available in Faith Mission Bookshop] 'The 'Adventure of Christmas' by Ed Drew, a book for all the family, again from the Good Book Company.

We will host the Lisburn & Castlereagh PSNI Community Carol Service on Monday 9th December at 11.00 am in the church with local schools singing. There will be light refreshments in the hall after the service. Do invite friends to this Carol Service and to our worship at Christmas.

We do think of others at this time of year and we will donate gifts to Lisburn Foodbank [selection boxes, chocolate yule logs or mini chocolate rolls] and the Salvation Army [gifts for all the family, vouchers or cash] on Sunday 1st December.

The Christmas bauble scheme this year will be for the Leprosy Mission NI. See the notice in this magazine for information.

Christmas

The nativity is on Sunday 22nd December at 11.30 am with our KLIC and JAM groups taking part. We have our parish Carol Service with our choir at 6.30 pm and this is followed by refreshments in the hall provided by the GFS. It is a joy to have **Bishop Fanta Clarke** speak at our Carol Service on the story of Christmas. Do invite friends and family to the services over Christmas. I am aware that people travel to be with family. Seek out a local church and worship with them.

We gather on Christmas Eve at 11.15 pm for our Communion Service and then on Christmas Day we have an early Communion service at 8.30 am followed by an all-age family service at 10.30 am. Our children and young people can bring some of their Christmas gifts to this service.

Our Watchnight Service at 6.30 pm on Tuesday 31st December will be followed by a cuppa in the church.

As we journey this year through Advent to Christmas, we pray for light into the darkness in places such as Ukraine, Sudan, Israel/Gaza/Lebanon.

We pray for the persecuted church where it may be costly to celebrate the coming of Jesus in a public way.

Around 2000 years ago, Jesus was born in Bethlehem, bringing light into the darkness of the world then. Not only do we need light, love and peace but salvation. Mankind needs salvation. We are imploding as a world but yet we often think we can shape our own destiny without any reference to Jesus. I pray we would take time to draw near to the One who was born in Bethlehem to save us from our sins, to draw us back to the Father, to bring us peace and to walk in the ways of the Father and worship Him.

"Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests." [Luke 2: 13,14]

Looking ahead into 2025, there will be a very special weekend, **'Deep and Wide'** which reflects the 20^{th} anniversary of my institution as Rector of this parish which is Sunday 19^{th} January. We would ask that parishioners put the dates of the 17^{th} - 19^{th} January in your diary as we have a Barn Dance on the Friday night at 7.30 pm. On Saturday we have a programme of teaching and fellowship for all ages from 10.30 am to 4.30 pm. We are delighted that the Rev Peter Jones who is rector of Mossley parish will share on Saturday and then on Sunday at the service at **10.30 am** as we will have time for fellowship and food after this service. We also will have Victoria Jackson and Play it by Ear helping shape the activities on the Saturday. This is a weekend to give thanks for the last 20 years but also to shape our witness and ministry as a parish in the coming years. I do hope you will see this an opportunity for you to grow in your relationship with the Lord and one another.

In our recent sermon series, we explored the concept of stewardship, a call to manage all that God has entrusted to us with care and intention. Stewardship isn't just about financial giving, though that's an important part; it encompasses how we interact with the world, our bodies, our resources, and each other.

The series began with a focus on **environmental stewardship.** We were reminded that the earth is God's creation, entrusted to us not only for our benefit but as something we're responsible to care for and preserve for future generations. By practicing sustainability in our daily lives, we honour this responsibility. In particular we focused on the creation narrative and the idea that in the dominion that God has given to us over the world we have a responsibility to care for all that has been created.

In this series we also touched on the theme of our **personal stewardship**, particularly concerning substances like alcohol. This involves being mindful of how our choices affect our health, mind, and spirit, as well as the well-being of those around us. Stewardship, in this context, is about respecting the body and mind that God has given us and asking ourselves what is my motivation if/when we reach for such substances. Our motivation in all we consume should be honouring God and seeking to be more like him.

A key topic in the series was our **stewardship of relationships**. We are called to care for one another, supporting each other's needs and nurturing a sense of community. This includes being there for friends and family, and extending compassion and service to those beyond our immediate circles. We are called to love one another, regardless if we like each other or not. Living alongside others can often lead to friendship or to conflict (or in some cases, even both). Christ called us to love everyone with the same love that he has shown us.

Of course, in these series we also took the time to dive into **financial stewardship**, which holds a special emphasis in scripture. Our financial resources are gifts from God, and using them wisely is an act of faith. This doesn't just mean giving generously but also managing our resources responsibly, so we're able to contribute to God's work on earth in a meaningful way. Our CAP money course was there to help equip all to be able to manage our finances in difficult times for everyone. We too in the

church are seeing costs rise and are seeking to always find new ways to ensure we continue to meet the needs of others. To see the hungry fed. The naked clothed. The weak protected.

The series challenged us to see stewardship not as a duty, but as an invitation to live intentionally, honouring God in every aspect of our lives by how we manage and care for all we've been given. At the centre of it all the most important factor is our heart. We should never serve just from a sense of duty or subjection, but rather to see our service and stewardship as a way to live for God and honour him with all that he has entrusted us with.

Journey to the Manger



Luke Chapter 2:4-7

"And Joseph also went up from Galilee, out of the city of Nazareth, into Judea, unto the city of David, which is called Bethlehem; (because he was of the house and lineage of David) to be taxed with Mary his espoused wife, being

great with child. And so it was, that, while they were there, the days were accomplished that she should be delivered. And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped Him in swaddling clothes, and laid Him in a manger, because there was no room in the inn."

It really must have been so terribly difficult for a heavily pregnant Mary and Joseph as they journeyed towards Bethlehem. They were entering a very difficult situation as they pleaded for somewhere to stay. I am sure that you can picture the scene of desperation as Joseph begs a reluctant innkeeper for any place at all for Mary to deliver this special child. The innkeeper finally relents and leads them to a tumbledown stable.

As we journey through this Advent period, the lack of room for Jesus in peoples hearts is still very evident, and we run the risk of not having enough room in our "Personal Inn" to receive Jesus this Christmas.

As Christians, we celebrate the fact that The True Son Of God was about to be born. The Incarnation had begun, God is with us, A King is born, No robes, No Palace. A Son is born in the village of Bethlehem. All of those who had witnessed this wonderful event, The Shepherd, The Wise Men, none of them had doubted for one moment what they had just witnessed. The Shepherds had abandoned their flocks in the fields, The Wise Men had travelled a great distance and followed the star. However, at the end of their journey they found The Saviour Of The World.

So today, as you read this article, you must visualise that you are on a journey to Bethlehem to meet Jesus face to face. We must have that same Faith of The Shepherds and The Wise Men. He is The King of Kings and Lord of Lords and He made His life amongst us. May you be truly Blessed with that same Faith.

Always remember that at this Festive Time..... The Baby and The Man, The Incarnate Saviour, is seeking a guest room in your heart. All you have to do is invite Him in.



Communication from Hospital Chaplains

The Hospital Chaplains across both Northern and Belfast Health & Social Care Trusts play an important role in supporting patients who are connected to Church of Ireland parishes with their spiritual and emotional needs. Some patients are in hospital for a very short period and others can be in for months. Most Chaplains visit patients on a weekly basis, however there are a few issues which prevent this from happening :

- Some hospital staff may not record details of a patient's religious information or their wish to see a minister. This legitimately could be because when the patient arrives in the hospital their medical needs are the priority.
- A patient's family may not always contact their minister to inform them they are in hospital, sometimes because of the obvious pressures the family may be feeling while a loved one is unwell.

A new electronic patient care system is being rolled out nationally at present which will digitise all patient paper records, and with it, we are finding that it is more difficult to identify patients' spiritual needs. Therefore as a Chaplaincy Team, we would ask that where you know a parishioner to be in hospital, to please let the Chaplaincy team know. This allows us to provide support not only to the patient, but also to support clergy who at times with pressing demands may not be able to visit the hospital. Also where there are infections on a ward, it may not be possible for clergy to visit patients, however the Chaplains as hospital staff are usually able to visit with suitable precautions.

We would also ask you to encourage your congregations that when a family member is in hospital, to ask the ward staff to raise a referral (now known as a Spiritual Consult) so that a Chaplain knows to visit them.


Please be assured that where we know a patient's church and they permit it, we will let rectors know they are in hospital.

As a chaplaincy team, we are here to support your ministry, and so anything that can be done to provide pastoral care to parishioners while in hospital, please know that you can contact us.

Lisburn Community Dementia Care

I was delighted to get the opportunity to share a little about our group at the Tuesday Coffee Morning on Tuesday 5th November.

We shared the platform with Allison from Dementia NI who gave a thought provoking insight into living with dementia.



Our group has been running in the church for several years now and we are a team of 5 volunteers all of whom have had hands on experience supporting a loved one with dementia in addition to working in volunteer roles with Alzheimer's Society.

Three of our volunteers are retired nurses.

Our group was established as a cross community self funded peer support group. Every penny we receive is spent on our group and our members.

(Lisburn Community Dementia Care continued)

Our main aim is to improve the quality of life for those with dementia and their carers in the hope that we can build confidence through communication and friendships.

Our activities are aimed at giving individuals a chance to try out something that they maybe haven't tried before thus opening up new experiences and building confidence.

Activities include visiting musicians, reminisce sessions, craft, exercise, pottery, painting, mindfulness to name a few. We also invite visiting speakers to give advice on a range of topics - Citizens Advice, PSNI, Fire Service, Rose NI etc.

We currently have on average between 25-30 folks each month and have watched our group numbers increase. Our church hall is a very safe and friendly environment in which to meet with lots of chat and fun.

We meet the 3rd Thursday of every month and start at 1.00 pm with a light lunch followed by cake, buns etc and a final cuppa at the end of the day. The cost of this is £3.00 per person.

Our group is open to folks at all stages of their dementia journey and everyone must be accompanied with a carer/family member.

We also liaise with the South Eastern Trusts Dementia Navigator who pops into our sessions. She is available to chat to anyone who has any questions or concerns.

To receive a dementia diagnosis is a very frightening experience for both the patient and their loved ones, however, a person can live well with the right care and support.

We feel that we provide a lifeline for people with dementia and their carers and are greatly encouraged by the comments we receive.

In this day and age, I'm sure we all know or have known someone with a dementia diagnosis.






